Friends of Brook Hollows

The Friends of Brook Hollows continue to work hard at Rolleston Brook Hollows on the first Sunday of the month with activities including litter picking, footpath maintenance, cutting back scrub, invasive species removal and setting up log circles for community groups to use.

In July, the Friends were joined by the Burton Conservation Volunteers and the Burton Ahmadiyya Muslim Community to construct some formal footpaths in areas of the woodland that become impassable during the winter months. Drainage was dug out and tonnes of stone was wheelbarrowed to site by hard working volunteers. The finished paths have since been topped with woodchip to help them blend with the rest of the woodland paths.
