



# Green Conversations, Wednesday 26th July 2023

### Outline of day

This Green Conversations event was held at Rugeley Community Centre on Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> July, 1-4pm. It was hosted by Support Staffordshire through the Transforming the Trent Valley scheme, and supported by VAST and Staffordshire Wildlife Trust staff.

The aims of this event were:

- To provide a space for community and voluntary groups who are interested in 'green' issues
  (this term was deliberately used loosely to encourage a range of groups to attend) to
  network, create new contacts and share ideas and resources.
- To introduce the idea of a Staffordshire Green Network for community groups, to provide the initial plans for the structure of the network and to gain feedback on these plans

The format of the event mostly focussed around three guided conversations, led by staff from Support Staffordshire, Staffordshire Wildlife Trust and VAST:

Table 1 (Support Staffordshire): Funding and Development – successes and challenges

Table 2 (VAST): Staffordshire Green Network – your ideas

Table 3 (Staffordshire Wildlife Trust): Networking and resources – what is needed?

After an initial introduction to the event and attendees in the room, as well as a welcome and introduction to the retrofit work of Rugeley Community Centre by the manager Chris Fielding, there were three rounds of 20 minute conversations to allow attendees to rotate between the tables. Participants were not required to rotate round tables in a particular order, they could choose which tables they engaged with, and for how long. There were 10 minutes break between each round of conversations to allow for informal conversation or refreshment breaks.

There was also a resource table available for attendees to pick up and share resources or leaflets from their own groups.

Key themes from event and attendees

### **Table 1: Funding and Development**

#### Key themes:

- 1. Difficult to have a full overview of an area, such as other groups doing similar work, public spaces available for environmental projects, community engagement with activities
- 2. Funding challenges: it takes a long time to get to a point where you are eligible to apply for funding (eg sorting bank account, constitution, required policies and procedures, then the ongoing admin time for managing funds), public bodies usually not eligible for charitable funding, sustainability work is given limited resources in existing budgets.
- 3. Development challenges: setting up bank accounts for small voluntary organisations, managing time (admin vs 'doing')





#### Table 2: Green Network - your ideas

#### Key themes:

- 1. There is a need for a knowledge hub/directory accessible to community groups: including information about other groups doing similar work or projects, contact information so groups can reach out to each other for support and collaboration, useful resources, case studies to learn from.
- 2. Communication. Linked to the knowledge hub, there is a need for better communication about different sustainability initiatives in Staffordshire. This could take the form of newsletters, email, social media, articles in press or magazines, and utilisation of existing communications channels.
- 3. Working across different sectors. There were several mentions of wanting to know what bigger environmental organisations were doing, what the council were doing (both County and District councils), what Keele University were working on, and how community groups could connect with all of these other sectors. Linked to this is the desire for specific training/Q+A sessions, for example with retrofit installers, or speakers on different topics.

### **Table 3: Networking and Resources**

### Key themes:

1. Groups were able to share some general challenges they face, and ask each other for advice. Some thoughts shared were around the channels of promotion for community/volunteer events, how to manage volunteers, and highlighting some of the successful projects in Staffordshire (eg repair cafes, cycling groups and a growing food network).

### **Attendees**

31 attendees from 22 different organisations attended the event. Attendees came from voluntary groups, constituted community groups, registered charities, public sector bodies, parish, town and district councils and local businesses. Appendix 3 outlines the organisations in attendance.

15 of the 31 attendees were paid staff, the remainder attended as volunteers representing different groups. 8 attendees had previously attended the previous Community Conversations event, held in January 2023 in Uttoxeter.

### **Next steps**

Future Green Conversations are being planned by VAST and Support Staffordshire/TTTV to continue gaining insight into what community groups might want from a Green Network. These will be held in different areas of Staffordshire – so far planned in Stoke on Trent and between Lichfield/Tamworth in autumn 2023.

These future events could be used to delve deeper into some of the key themes to focus the work of the Green Network. For example, to learn more about the methods of communication that could be





used to share information and resources, or what training and advice is most needed to support different groups in their sustainability journey.

An online survey can also be utilised to gain these deeper insights into how best a Green Network can benefit the VCSE sector, and advance sustainability actions in Staffordshire.

Consideration should be given to the name of future event. As mentioned by one attendee, naming events 'eco' or 'green' attracts people who are already working on the sustainability or environmental issues. To increase the range of groups and individuals taking action for climate or wanting to begin taking action for the climate, the events need to be advertised in a way to attract these new groups.

Some of the queries and challenges faced by groups (support in setting up a bank account, developing policies and finding funding) can be addressed through Support Staffordshire, VAST and SCVYS's existing offer to organisations. See links for websites and information.

While there are in existence numerous directories of community groups in Staffordshire, it is clear that these are either not know about widely, or not fit for the purpose of finding other like-minded community groups. This piece of work could form part of the future Green Network, to research existing directories and whether they can be improved to benefit Staffordshire green groups.



Proposed structure of a VCSE Staffordshire Green Network:
